

CLYDESDALE HARRIERS.

Rules.

I.—That the Club be called the "CLYDESDALE HARRIERS."

II.—That the object of the Club be the promotion of Amateur Athletics generally, and Cross-Country Running in particular.

III.—That the general management of the Club be vested in a Committee not exceeding Eighteen Members, of whom Fifteen shall be elected at the Annual General Meeting of the Club, including, at least, a President, Vice-President, Two Joint Secretaries, Treasurer, Captain, and Vice-Captain. One representative to be elected by each Section. Five Members to form a quorum.

IV.—That each Candidate for election, upon filling up a form declaring that he is an amateur, according to the following definition:—"An amateur is one who has never competed for a money prize or monetary consideration, or for any declared wager or staked bet; who has never engaged in, assisted in, or taught any athletic exercises as a means of pecuniary gain; and who has never taken part in any competition with any one who is not an amateur";—and that he will abide by the Laws of the Club, shall be proposed by one Member and seconded by another, after which his name will be submitted to the Committee, and, if agreed upon, passed. Any Member of Committee shall have the power of demanding a Ballot in the case of any Candidate. One black ball in four to exclude.

V.—That the Annual Subscription for Ordinary Members be Three Shillings and Sixpence (for Honorary Members, Five Shillings), payable on the 1st of October in each year; and that the Subscription for Life Members be One Guinea. New Members' Subscriptions must be paid within One Month from the date of notice from the Secretary that their application has been passed, otherwise their election may be declared null and void.

VI.—That the Treasurer shall place before the Committee the names of all Members one month in Arrears for Subscriptions or other moneys, the Committee then having the power to enforce payment of such by legal proceedings, if necessary, and no one whose Subscription has been allowed to fall in arrears shall be entitled to any of the rights and privileges of Members of the Club.

VII.—That any Member intending to withdraw from the Club shall give written notice to the Secretary before the Annual General Meeting, or be liable for another year's Subscription.

VIII.—That any Member violating the Rules of the Club or of the amateur definition, as per Rule IV., or doing anything prejudicial to the interests of either, may be expelled from the Club by the votes of two-thirds of the full Committee.

IX.—That the uniform of the Club be Black Knickers and White Jersey, and that the Club Badge (a Horn and Whip, with the motto, "Excelsior,") be worn on the left breast at Athletic Sports, and the Gate Badge on back at Cross-Country Runs. (Members are specially requested to enter under the name of the Club at Athletic Meetings.)

X.—That the Committee shall allot the Management of the Headquarters' Districts to certain of its members, who will look after said Districts, and assist the Secretary and Treasurer, so far as these are concerned, the Section Committees appointing their own District Managers, and otherwise looking after the immediate business of their Sections. The Committee shall appoint any Sub-Committees which they may consider advisable, and have full power to fill up vacancies in the General Committee and act for the Club (except to alter Rules), the majority in all cases to decide, the Chairman or President of the Club, however, having the power to appeal to a full Special General Committee Meeting. That the Meetings of Committees be held on the first Thursday of each month, or as near that date as possible, at least two days' notice to be given by the Secretary when, together with other current business, the Minutes of the Sub-Committees, as well as the Treasurer's Financial Statement up to the end of the previous month will be read and considered.

XI.—That the Annual General Meeting be held early in September, and called by Circular. The Reports of the Secretaries and Treasurer shall be submitted, and the Office-bearers and Committee (with

Auditor to act in conjunction with one appointed by the Committee) appointed for the ensuing year. Twenty members shall form a quorum; a majority to decide. The Chairman shall have the power to appeal to a Special General Meeting on any special business, at which there must be Thirty Members present.

XII.—That a Special General Meeting may be called by the Committee, or by any Ten Members, or (in the above special case) by the Chairman on giving notice to the Secretary, who shall call the meeting in the same manner as the A.G.M.

XIII.—That these Rules be inserted in the Club's "Annual," and that no alteration in, or addition to, the Rules be made except at the Annual General Meeting, or at a Special Meeting called for that purpose. Notice of such alteration to be given to the Secretary, not later than 1st September, or ten days previous to any Special General Meeting.

Cross-Country Regulations.

I.—That Cross-Country Runs be held on Saturdays, from the 1st of October to the end of March, or on such dates as the Committee may fix.

II.—That the Club when out for a run shall be under the management of the Captain or Vice-Captain, or Senior Member of Committee present, who shall appoint a Pace-Maker and Whip for the control of each pack.

III.—That no one, when out for a run, shall be allowed to go ahead of the Pace-Maker, unless the run be a racing run, or the signal be given by the Pace-Maker for a race home.

IV.—That every member of the Club is expected to wear the Club Uniform at the Club Runs, and to support the management for the time being.

Notes from the Twentieth ANNUAL REPORT of the Club.

THE Membership has steadily increased, 58 new Members having been admitted during the past year, while 2 Members resigned.

With reference to the financial position of the Club, it is gratifying to state that we have now a fair sum at credit in the Bank.

The season opened at Thornliebank on 1st October, 1904, with the usual Headquarters' and Sections' joint runs, and continued till middle of March.

Various visits were made to the Sections, while Inter-Club Runs were held with the following Clubs, viz.:— Paisley Harriers, Glenpark Harriers, Edinburgh Harriers, Waverley Harriers, Garscubie Harriers, Maryhill Harriers, and Corporation Harriers.

The attendance at several of the runs was not as large as it might have been, and this defect will, I trust, be remedied during the coming season.

The various Handicaps resulted as follows:—

Five Miles Novice—1st in actual race, Inglis Murray, Headquarters; 2nd do., W. H. Holmes, Headquarters; 3rd do., James M'Cue, Headquarters, 1st in Handicap, Alex. Shepherd, Headquarters; 2nd do., W. H. Holmes, Headquarters; 3rd do., James M'Cue, Headquarters.

Five Miles Open—1st in actual race, Sam. Stevenson, Headquarters, 1st in Handicap, Geo. S. Campbell, Airdrie; 2nd do., R. C. M'Donald, Airdrie; 3rd do., W. G. Kerr, Headquarters.

Team Contest and Club Championship—Club Champion, Sam. Stevenson. The Team Race was won by the Vice-Captain's Team with a total of 21 points, the Captain's Team being second with 31 points, Airdrie being third with 35 points, and Dumbartonshire fourth with 51 points.

Seven Miles Confined—1st, And. Forrester; 2nd, Sam. Stevenson; 3rd, James Reston.

The Grand Open Handicap and Team Contest, with which we included an Open Hundred Yards Race, was held at Scotstoun Show Ground, and proved a great success, though the Sprint did not fill as well as expected.

Going through the ground for the first time, Sam. Stevenson, Jas. Reston, and P. C. Russell, were leading, running neck and neck, and they finished in the order named, S. Stevenson winning by 20 yards from James Reston, with P. C. Russell a little behind.

The Handicap resulted as follows:—1st. Alex. Cross, Clydesdale Harriers; 2nd R. R. Lambie, Clydesdale Harriers; 3rd, Jas. Somerville, Motherwell Y. M. C. A. Harriers.

Seventeen Teams entered for the Team Contest which was won by the Edinburgh Southern Harriers with a total of 12 points, Bellahouston Harriers being second with 36 points, and Hamilton Harriers third with 43 points.

It had been agreed that the Competition for the handsome Cup presented by Mr. Andrew Hannah should be decided by points gained in the various Club Handicaps, and also in National Championship, and was won by Mr. Sam. Stevenson.

With reference to the Championships we were scarcely so well up as in former years.

In the Western District Union Championship we were again second with a total of 105 points. Placed men were W. J. Martin, 4; Geo. S. Campbell, 5; Alex. Cross, 17; Inglis Murray, 21; W. H. Holmes, 22; and Jas. A. Smith, 36.

In the National Championship at Scotstoun we were only third with a total of 127 points.

Sam. Stevenson finished third in this race, he, as well as the other Members of the Team hardly running to true form, but in the International Race at Dublin he made amends for this by being first home for Scotland, and fifth in the actual race—the highest place ever yet filled by a Scotsman. T. Johnston, another member of the Club, finished eleventh in this race, and was second man home for Scotland.

Our annual Sports took place this year at Celtic Park, on 27th May: although we had a special attraction in a 4 miles handicap in which J.A. Aldridge who won the International Race at Dublin, and the A.A.A. 10 miles championship,

competed, along with Sam. Stevenson who won the event—and the cream of Scottish talent—we did not get the support we merited. This could be accounted for by the fact that the "Charity" final was played that day at Ibrox, Celtic and Third Lanark being the finalists.

We were, however, able to show a Balance Sheet with a few pounds to the good.

After a lengthy correspondence, we were granted the use of Dunoon Town Council's Athletic Ground for Sports to be held there, along with the local Club, on Fair Saturday and Monday, 15th and 17th July. Unfortunately, the weather on the Monday was of the most miserable description, and we lost heavily on the venture, but the work of the Club will not be hampered by this, as the Committee have struck on a novel idea, whereby, it is anticipated, the money will ultimately be raised—the pressing demands being met by means of a loan.

Several of our runners were well to the fore on the track, Sam. Stevenson being the most successful, winning the 10 miles and 4 miles flat championships, and many other races, and giving promise of following in the footsteps of the many famous runners, Members of the Club, who have added lustre to the Club.

In closing, I may say that the majority of the Members of Committee have been most attentive in their duties, your President especially so.

The finances of the Club were well looked after by your Treasurer, Mr. George M. Kay, and I beg to thank you all for the assistance rendered to me.

This year we enter on our majority as a Club, having been instituted in May, 1885. The Committee feel that this event should be celebrated in a suitable manner, and it is proposed that some function be held where old members may meet and "fight their battles o'er again," and be introduced to those members of later date who are now trying to uphold the honourable traditions of the Club, by following in the footsteps of their illustrious predecessors, and who always remember our motto,

"EXCELSIOR."
