CLYDESDALE HARRIERS.

Rules.

I.—That the Club be called the "CLYDESDALE HARRIERS."

II.—That the object of the Club be the promotion of Amateur Athletics generally, and Cross-Country Running in particular.

III.—That the general management of the Club be vested in a Committee not exceeding Twenty Members, of whom Fifteen shall be elected at the Annual General Meeting of the Club, including, at least, a President, Vice-President, Two Joint Secretaries, Treasurer, Captain, and Vice-Captain. Two representatives to be elected by each Section. Five Members to form a quorum.

IV.—That each Candidate for election, upon filling up a form declaring that he is an amateur, according to the following definition:—"An amateur is one who has never competed for a money prize or monetary consideration, or for any declared wager or staked bet; who has never engaged in, assisted in, or taught any athletic exercises as a means of pecuniary gain; and who has never taken part in any competition with any one who is not an amateur":—and that he will abide by the Laws of the Club, shall be proposed by one Member and seconded by another, after which his name will be submitted to the Committee, and, if agreed upon, passed. Any Member of Committee shall have the power of demanding a Ballot in the case of any Candidate. One black ball in four to exclude.

V.—That the Annual Subscription for Ordinary Members be Three Shillings and Sixpence (for Honorary Members, Five Shillings), payable on the 1st of October in each year; and that the Subscription for Life Members be One Guinea. New Members' Subscriptions must be paid within One Month from the date of notice from the Secretary that their application has been passed, otherwise their election may be declared null and void.

VI.—That the Treasurer shall place before the Committee the names of all Members one month in Arrears for Subscriptions or other moneys, the Committee then having the power to enforce payment of such by legal proceedings, if necessary, and no one whose Subscription has been allowed to fall in arrears shall be entitled to any of the rights and privileges of Members of the Club.

VII.—That any Member intending to withdraw from the Club shall give written notice to the Secretary before the Annual General Meeting, or be liable for another year's Subscription.

VIII.—That any Member violating the Rules of the Club or of the amateur definition, as per Rule IV., or doing anything prejudicial to the interests of either, may be expelled from the Club by the votes of two-thirds of the full Committee.

IX.—That the uniform of the Club be Black Knickers and White Jersey, and that the Club Badge (a Horn and Whip, with the motto, "Excelsior,") be worn on the left breast at Athletic Sports, and the Gate Badge on back at Cross-Country Runs. (Members are specially requested to enter under the name of the Club at Athletic Meetings.)

X.—That the Committee shall allot the Management of the Headquarters Districts to certain of its members, who will look after said Districts, and assist the Secretary and Treasurer, so far as these are concerned, the Section Committees appointing their own District Managers, and otherwise looking after the immediate business of their Sections. The Committee shall appoint any Sub-Committees which they may consider advisable, and have full power to fill up vacancies in the General Committee and act for the Club (except to alter Rules), the majority in all cases to decide, the Chairman or President of the Club, however, having the power to appeal to a full Special General Committee Meeting. That the Meetings of Committees be held on the first Thursday of each month, or as near that date as possible, at least two days' notice to be given by the Secretary when, together with other current business, the Minutes of the Sub-Committees, as well as the Treasurer's Financial Statement up to the end of the previous month will be read and considered.

XI.—That the Annual General Meeting be held early in September, and called by Circular. The Reports of the Secretaries and Treasurer shall be submitted, and the Office-bearers and Committee (with

Auditor to act in conjunction with one appointed by the Committee) appointed for the ensuing year. Twenty members shall form a quorum; a majority to decide. The Chairman shall have the power to appeal to a Special General Meeting on any special business, at which there must be Thirty Members present.

XII.—That a Special General Meeting may be called by the Committee, or by any Ten Members, or (in the above special case) by the Chairman on giving notice to the Secretary, who shall call the meeting in the same manner as the A.G.M.

XIII.—That these Rules be inserted in the Club's "Annual," and that no alteration in, or addition to, the Rules be made except at the Annual General Meeting, or at a Special Meeting called for that purpose. Notice of such alteration to be given to the Secretary, not later than 1st September, or ten days previous to any Special General Meeting.

Cross-Country Regulations.

I.—That Cross-Country Runs be held on Saturdays, from the 1st of October to the end of March, or on such dates as the Committee may fix.

II.—That the Club when out for a run shall be under the management of the Captain or Vice-Captain, or Senior Member of Committee present, who shall appoint a Pace-Maker and Whip for the control of each pack.

III.—That no one, when out for a run, shall be allowed to go ahead of the Pace-Maker, unless the run be a racing run, or the signal be given by the Pace-Maker for a race home.

IV.—That every member of the Club is expected to wear the Club Uniform at the Club Runs, and to support the management for the time being.

NOTES

FROM THE

TWENTY-FIRST ANNUAL REPORT OF THE CLUB.

THE Membership of the Club continues to increase steadily. During the past year 50 new Members were admitted, while 5 resigned.

The season opened with the usual Headquarters and Sections' Joint Run at Thornliebank, and continued until the end of March.

The Sections were each visited several times, and Inter-Club Runs were held with the following clubs:—Paisley Harriers, Edinburgh Harriers, Glenpark Harriers, Maryhill Harriers, Bellahouston Harriers, and Garscube Harriers.

It is pleasing to note that the attendance at Club Runs was somewhat better than during the previous season, but it still leaves much to be desired; and the Committee trust that Members will turn out as regularly as possible during the coming season.

The various Handicaps resulted as follows:—

Five Miles Novice Handicap—1st in actual race, Andrew Raeside, Airdrie; 2nd do., Thomas Angus, Headquarters; 3rd do., Joseph Manders, Headquarters. 1st in Handicap,

Joseph Manders, Headquarters; 2nd do., Thomas Angus, Headquarters; 3rd do., John M'Dougall, Headquarters.

Five Miles Open Handicap—1st in actual race, Geo. S. Campbell, Airdrie. 1st in Handicap, Peter M'Lean, Headquarters; 2nd do., William Gall, Headquarters; 3rd do., C. W. M'Pherson, Headquarters.

Seven Miles Confined Handicap—1st in Handicap, Jas. A. Smith; 2nd do., Wm. H. Holmes; 3rd do., Alex. J. Forrester.

Club Championship and Team Contest—Club Champion, Sam. Stevenson.

The Team Race was won by the Vice-Captain's Team with a total of 26 points, Dumbarton Section being second with 28 points; while the Captain's Team and Airdrie Section were third and fourth with 35 and 49 points respectively.

Two Miles Track Race—1st, Sam. Stevenson (scratch)—time, 9 min. 56 4-5 sec.; 2nd, Alex. J. Forrester (160 yds.); 3rd, Alex. Cross (160 yds.).

The Grand Open Handicap and Team Contest, with which was included an Open Hundred Yards Race, was held at Scotstoun under very trying weather conditions, a thick fog covering the ground and rendering invisible objects ten yards off. It was, however, carried through in a fairly satisfactory manner. 1st in actual race, Sam. Stevenson. The Handicap resulted as follows:—1st, A. S. Muirden, Motherwell Y.M.C.A. Harriers; 2nd, David Proctor, Monkland Harriers; 3rd, William M'Gregor,

Falkirk Victoria Harriers. Nineteen teams entered for the Team Contest, which was won by Hamilton Harriers with a total of 11 points, Monkland Harriers being second with 19 points, and Garscube Harriers third with 29 points.

Coming now to the Cross-Country Championships, we may say that we have held our own.

In the Western District Championship we hardly ran as well as we expected, only finishing third with a total of 212 points. Placed men were—Alex. Mann, 17; Wm. H. Holmes, 26; Alex. Cross, 29; Wm. Gall, 33; James A. Smith, 38; and Andrew Raeside, 69.

In the National Championship at Scotstoun we gained a brilliant victory, winning both individual and team honours—a victory which we appreciated the more in this our Coming-of-Age Year. The placing of the team were as follows:—Sam. Stevenson, 1; Alex. Mann, 8; Jas. A. Ure, 9; Alex. Cross, 13; George S. Campbell, 20; Wm. Robertson, 23—a total of 74 points.

The Hannah Cup was again won by Sam. Stevenson, who had the greatest number of points during the season.

The Dinner to celebrate the Coming of Age of the Club was held in the Grosvenor Restaurant, Glasgow, on 20th March, and proved a great success. Mr. Alexander M. Kennedy, one of the earliest Presidents of the Club, occupied the chair, and, in addition to large numbers of past and present Members of the Club, there were also present all the leading lights of the Scottish athletic world.

Our Annual Sports were held at Celtic Park on 26th

May, and proved a great success; and it gives the Committee great pleasure to report a favourable balance.

We again held Meetings at Dunoon on Glasgow Fair Saturday and Monday along with the local club, and we regret to state that, owing to miserable weather on both the Saturday and Monday, there was a considerable loss on the venture. Had it not been for the weather we are certain that this Meeting would have proved a great success. Junior Football Tournaments were included in both programmes, and proved to be most popular.

Several of our Members were very successful on the track this season, particularly Sam. Stevenson and Wm. H. Holmes—the former again winning the Four Miles Championship and also many other races.

It is pleasing to note that the Sections are progressing very favourably, both Dumbartonshire and Airdrie Sections having added many new Members.

In closing, I may state that the Finances were well looked after by the Treasurer, Mr. George M. Kay, and that the majority of the Committee have been very regular in their attendance, and have always done their best to uphold the best traditions of the Club.

THE CLUB'S COMING OF AGE.

THE “Coming of Age” of the Club was celebrated on the 20th of March, 1906, when a large and representative gathering of past and present members, and a few invited friends, dined together in the Large Saloon of the Grosvenor Restaurant, Glasgow. Covers were laid for one hundred.

Mr. Alexander M. Kennedy, President of the Club in 1890 and 1891, occupied the chair, and was supported by Bailie Hugh Alexander, J.P., J. G. Kerr, Esq., M.A., LL.D., R. K. Kinninmont, Esq., President S.A.A.A., and others.

Apologies for absence were intimated from Mr. Harry Anderson Watt, M.P., Mr. D. S. Duncan, Hon. Secretary S.A.A.A., and Councillor James Henderson, J.P.

After the loyal and patriotic toasts had been given and responded to, Dr. Kerr proposed the “Corporation of Glasgow,” and Bailie Alexander replied.

The Chairman then proceeded to give the toast of the evening—“The Clydesdale Harriers”—and in an instructive, interesting, and carefully prepared speech, gave a resumé of the Club's history from its inception to the present time, dealing in a most exhaustive manner with these events, in which the Club played its part, whose influence are even now felt in Scottish Amateur Athletics. Mr. Andrew Hannah replied.

Mr. Alexander Honeyman proposed "The Scottish Amateur Athletic Association." Mr. R. K. Kinninmont, President, replied.

The "National Cross Country Union of Scotland" was proposed by Mr. Charles Pennycook and replied to by the Hon. Secretary and Treasurer, Mr. A. Ross Scott.

"Kindred Clubs" proposed by Mr. Thomas Birrell and replied to by Mr. John B. Wilson, West of Scotland Harriers, Mr. Wm. Struthers, Glenpark Harriers, and Mr. John M'Culloch, Maryhill Harriers.

"The Press," proposed by Mr. Charles Thomson, replied to by Mr. Wm. (Pace) Wilson, and the "Chairman," proposed by Mr. Jas. Thyne, completed the toast list, and the company separated after singing "Auld Lang Syne."
