FOREWORD

The organizing committee would like to take this opportunity of expressing their appreciation of all who helped to make our Centenary Celebration Year the success it undoubtedly was.

At the start of our Fund Raising Campaign several years ago we set a target it was thought we could achieve, with an effort. Thanks, however, to the very generous support from all club members and friends that target was not only achieved but multiplied ten times over. It was very evident, and encouraging, that club members many of whom were comparatively new, had not only accepted the club traditions but were enthusiastically carrying them on.

Our thanks are especially due to the Social Committee and Club Secretary Phil Dolan for their invaluable contribution and also to Brian McAusland our Club Historian.

The first function was the open road race in March, now popularly known as the "Dunky Wright Race", when over 400 runners took part, each one receiving our special Centenary Medal.

On the afternoon of 4th May a fun-type pack run was held at Milngavie, starting from the Black Bull Inn where the club originated, on the same date, 100 years before. All started off together but then split up into packs according to ability, age or just inclination, and covered part of the same trail used at the first Clydesdale Harriers cross country run (no hunting horns were used), all participants received a Centenary Medal.

The Centenary Dinner was held at Cameron House Hotel, Hardgate on Saturday evening 4th May 1985 where 140 guests, members and friends had a most enjoyable evening. The speeches being lightened by entertainment between.

In September the Dinner Dance was held in Clydebank Town Hall and this allowed the ladies of the club their share in the Celebrations.

For the Young Athletes of the Club, and their friends, a very large, noisy and successful Disco was held in the Lesser Town Hall in December.

The highlight of course was the Centenary Dinner on our Anniversary Date, so ably chaired by Sir Patric Hamill QPM Chief Constable of Strathclyde (and of local origin).

Other guests included E S Murray OBE Chairman BAAB; E S Liddell President SAAA; J Cherry President SCCU; T Harrison President DAAA; Provost D Grainger Clydebank and District; A Anderson and D Childs Greenock Glenpark; and our very own "Jock" Semple of Boston USA.

Also from "across the sea" we welcomed Andy Divers from New Zealand and John Hume from Canada.

It was very heartening to have the support of many friends from various clubs over a wide area.

Having celebrated our Centenary we are now in the position of the legendary McNeill of Barra, who having dined, had the pronouncement made from the Castle Battlements "the McNeill has Dined, the rest of the world may now Dine".

As we enter our Second Century we look to the future with a reminder of the club motto — **EXCELSIOR !**

The Club insignia of hunting horn and riding crop would have been self-explanatory last century but its origin may be a little obscure for many of our younger members. Without doubt it came from the old practice of following the fox hunt on foot. This seems to have been a widespread practice which was largely spontaneous and unorganized.

In its cross country pack runs Clydesdale Harriers adopted the "Hares and Hounds" approach which was used by University Clubs. This consisted of sending out a couple of senior runners (Hares) to lay a paper trail, each one carrying a crescent shaped canvas bag of shredded paper for that purpose. They were followed after an agreed interval by the "Hounds" or Pack of Club Runners, whose aim was to overtake the Hares before they reached home. This practice continued well into the 1930's.

The first cross country run in 1885 was from the Black Bull Inn, Milngavie, and which followed a trail of about 13 miles over some very hilly country. The "Pace" who had to be a clear distance in front of the pack at all times, wore a green sash over his shoulder, while the "Whip", who wore a red sash, ran at the back of the pack. The "Whip" controlled the speed of the pack

by blowing a hunting horn if the pack showed signs of over-running the "Pace". Conversely if any pack members were struggling to keep up, the "Whip" blew the horn to slow down the "Pace". It is not known when the use of the horn was discontinued but it must have been a great relief to the "Whip" to be given a whistle instead.

The Club motto EXCELSIOR (which is an integral part of the insignia) means "Upward" or "Higher" but whichever is correct it must also refer to the hilly nature of our cross country trails.

This uplifting cry of "Excelsior" which was used to spur on members of long ago should surely be used again as our rallying call.

BRIEF HISTORY OF THE CLUB

Following a meeting in Glasgow on 4th May 1885, Clydesdale Harriers was formed as Scotland's first amateur open athletics club with the object of promoting amateur athletics generally and cross country running in particular. The club membership was not confined to Glasgow, but open to the whole West of Scotland as can be seen in the wide spread of noted runners such as A P Findlay from Ayr, Andrew Hannah from Glasgow, James Campbell from Helensburgh, John Clelland from Larkhall and James Henderson from Chryston. Memberships was also open to members of other sports clubs and football, cycling, rowing, and cricket clubs, were all represented in Clydesdale Harriers.

It is very interesting to note that Clydesdale Harriers football team played and beat Celtic in a Scottish Cup-Tie around 1889. The same season they also beat Third Lanark and Preston North End. Despite this promising debut by spare time amateurs the club committee turned down a proposal to form a permanent regular team on the grounds that their main interest was athletics.

A very good relationship prevailed between club officials and both Rangers and Celtic football clubs and many sport events were held in conjunction with these two clubs.

From an organisational point of view, it was easier to split the club into a number of sections (based in Ayrshire, Dumbartonshire, Lanarkshire, Renfrewshire and Stirlingshire) with the Headquarters Section based in Glasgow. Each section was assiduous in recruiting club members and the numbers grew from 120 (1887) to 650 and then to almost 1000. It had numbers, it had quality officials and it had enthusiasm. These qualities gave the club a level of success up to the 1914-18 war that no club could possibly hope to reach again.

Shortly after the foundation of the Clydesdale Harriers, Edinburgh Harriers was founded and in 1886 a breakaway from the club saw West of Scotland Harriers born. Inter club fixtures were arranged between the clubs and these did much to increase the interest in cross country running. An outcome of this was the establishing of cross country championships which eventually led to the formation of a Scottish Cross Country Association with its first championships in 1887. The club rally dominated Scottish athletics at this time and one indication of this is the fourteen cross country championship wins. Among the many really outstanding runners in the club then special mention must be made of Andrew Hannah with five cross country titles to his credit and numerous track championship wins at one, four and ten miles.

Clydesdale Harriers during this period clocked up an amazing number of firsts - the first club to run its own regular Open Cross Country Handicap, the first club to promote its own track sports meeting, the first club to promote two complete sports meetings in one season, the first club to promote a two-day sports meeting, the first club to attract top English and Irish stars to Scotland to compete, the first club to use commercial sponsorship, to arrange discounts on clothes, rail tickets and medical preparations for its members, to send a team to the British National Cross Country Championships and many others.

The key factor was the quality of club officials - men who worked hard for the club and yet who were keen to give sections their independence as soon as they were ready for it. Such clubs as Paisley Harriers, Ayr Harriers, Greenock Glenpark all began as branches of Clydesdale. By giving sections their independence, along with financial assistance to start them off, the size of the parent club was reduced and there was more competition for good quality runners. So it was that when the club committee was almost completely wiped out in the 1914-18 war, it was very difficult to start again exactly where they left off.

The twenties were bad for the club, - numbers were low, funds were low and what athletes were produced went elsewhere looking for success - Duncan McPhee (four times winner of the SHAA half mile and mile) and Duncan Wright were only two examples: there were others. Other top men left to look for work - Jock Semple being the outstanding example.

Jock Semple, who won the club Junior C.C Title in 1921, (the same year that the late Dunky Wright won the Senior Title) emigrated to America in the early 20's. He became a marathon runner and eventually joined Boston Athletic Association (with whom he is still connected) and became one of the leading administrators of the famous Boston Marathon. He became physiotherapist to Boston Bruins and amongst many other things was was trainer to United States hockey team for the world games and also to Olympic Teams.

"Jock" has visited his old club on many occasions, the outstanding one being the Club Centenary Dinner on 4th May 1985. He has been extremely generous and all we can say is in the words of his adoptive country "You're a great guy Jock!".

Nevertheless, the club committee worked hard and by the Thirties results were starting to improve again. A Ladies Section was started up in 1932 and it was this section that won Scottish titles at Cross Country - both team and individual via Jean Tait - and at 880 yards on the track - via Alison Ritchie. Another Clydesdale man, Hans Noble, was picked to run for Ireland too at this time. Unfortunately for the club, with results picking up and organisation showing what could be achieved, war broke out again in 1939.

This time the club kept ticking over during the war and, with casualties fortunately at a minimum, they were able to take up where they had left off. The stalwarts of the Twenties and Thirties were now working behind the scenes, there were some excellent new runners in the club such as George White and Bobby Boyd and the Ladies Section was restarted by Jean Tait, now Mrs Andrew McMillan.

So well had the war time committee done their work that the new committee could go immediately into action and the results, compared to the Inter-War years, were outstanding. During the 1950's the club reached a higher standard in all departments than at any time in its history with championship titles being won at all levels in both men's and women's sections. The most outstanding performances of this time were by John Wright when he won the National Junior Cross Country Championship in 1957 and 1958 and Anne Wilson when she won the British Intermediate Long Jump. Unfortunately many of the club members on whom further success could be built left the district, and of course, the club, at the end of the fifties.

It was not long, however, before the men's section was revitalised by the arrival of Ian Donald in the club in 1964 and by 1971 the club had won the only major Scottish Cross Country title to have eluded it throughout its entire history - the Western District Championship of Scotland. The senior men's middle and long distance runners reached a peak throughout the seventies that was very high indeed, winning this title three times in ten years and being placed in the first three a total of seven times. Individual honours at international level were won by Philip Dolan, Robert McWatt and Gary Miller with a host of runners being chosen by Scottish Select teams. Unfortunately this came to an end with the departure of many able athletes for a variety of reasons and the Eighties have seen a gradual rebuilding of the club. There are several very promising signs on the horizon but in the end it will depend on the committee what the future will be!

IMPORTANT

Members changing their address will please notify such change to secretary.

Cross Country Regulations

- 1) That runs be held (on Saturdays) from 1st October to the end of March or on such dates as decided.
- 2) That the club when out for a run shall be under the supervision of the Captain or Vice Captain.
- 3) That every member of the club is expected to wear the club uniform.

Club Races

Entries will close at the time set by the committee.

RULES

- 1) That the club shall be called the "Clydesdale Harriers".
- 2) That the object of the club be to encourage and further the interest of track, cross country and amateur athletics in general.
- 3) That the general management of the club be vested in a committee of fifteen who shall be elected at the Annual General Meeting of the club, including a President, Vice President, Secretary and Assistant Secretary, Treasurer and Assistant Treasurer, five members to form a Quorum.
- 4) That each candidate for election sends with his/her application the subscription for the year which will be returned if he/she is not elected and the candidate must also make the declaration that he/she is an amateur according to the SAAA/SWCCU ruling.
- 5) The Annual subscription shall be decided at the AGM. Levies if considered necessary, can be decided by the general committee.
- 6) The treasurer shall place before the committee all members who have paid their subscription within two months and after three months the treasurer shall then submit on the board all paid up members and append names when subscription is paid.
- 7) That any member intending to withdraw from the club must give written notice to the secretary.

8) The Rules of the club and those of the SAAA/SWAAA and SCCU/SWCCU must be obeyed.

9) That the uniform of the club be black pants with white band down sides and bottom with white singlet with black trimming and black "C" on front and back.

10) The Ladies section may have "Clydesdale" on the back of white blouses and club motif on front.

11) The general committee shall appoint any sub committees which they may consider advisable and have full power to fill any vacancies in the general committee.

12) The President will have the power to call a special meeting of the members. This meeting and the agenda must be circularised to all members.

13) That the General Committee Meeting be held on the third Friday of each month or as near that date as possible. The minutes of committee meetings shall be open for inspection on request.

14) Any Committee member absent from two consecutive regular meetings shall be excluded from the committee unless he previously gives notice of his intention of not being present. Any venue the committee should be notified personally.

15) That two general meetings be held in each year, one in April and one in September, and called by circular. At these meetings the reports of the Secretary and Treasurer shall be submitted. While at the meeting in April, in addition, there to the office bearers and committee (with auditor to act in conjunction with one appointed by the committee) shall be appointed for the ensuing year. Fifteen members shall form a Quorum, a majority to decide.

16) That a special General Meeting may be called by the President, committee or assistant secretary who shall call the meeting by circular. At least fifteen members must be present at such meeting.

17) That these rules be inserted in the club handbook and that no alteration in, or addition to, the rules be made except at the general meeting in April or at a special meeting called for that purpose. Notice of such alteration to be given to the secretary or assistant secretary at least fourteen days previous to any special general meeting or to the annual general meeting in April. That anything outwith these rules be governed by the rules of the SAAA/SWAAA and SCCU/SWCCU.

18) That the club shall have power to confer honorary membership upon any person as a token of esteem.
