

SMITH WELL
BEATEN.

LINDRUM'S RECORD

Lindrum established another high score on Saturday, when he scored in the fortnight's play in his match with Smith at Manchester with a total of 927 points, the highest score he has made since he arrived in England last year. His previous best was 776.

Smith's previous best was 230 against Davis at the Hobbins Hall, London, last month. The Australian, having a decisive lead when the final day began, strengthened his position with another four-figure break of 1050, his forty-fifth of the season. Earlier in the match he had taken an unfinished innings of 215. Smith made 290 and 342 in the first two innings.
