

WESTERN JUNIOR CHAMPIONSHIP.

A SUCCESSFUL RACE.

MONKLAND EASY WINNERS.

BELL FIRST MAN HOME.

This championship meeting, which was run off on the 1st inst., but declared "no race," was re-run on Saturday at Scotstoun Grounds. There was a most satisfactory turnout. The weather was not all that could be wished for, as at time of starting heavy fog hung round the enclosure, which was not at all conducive to record-breaking. Every precaution had been taken by Secretary F. M. Stoddart to make the racing a success, and his careful guidance, aided by his many willing workers, was most effective, as from start to finish not a grumble was heard. Two teams—viz., West of Scotland and Mauchline—were absent. Some 250 anxious and ardent competitors toed the line at the start. Bell and Clydesdale occupied the outside positions, and

the lot were got away to a capital start. Bell, who had got off fairly well, was not long in getting to the front. This advantage he held till leaving the field for the "open country." M'Phee at this stage occupying fifth position. The competitors once out of the field and out of sight, keen speculation took place amongst the crowd as to the ultimate winner. Good judges spotted Bell and M'Phee, and in this they were not far from the mark, as the former was first and the latter third. After an absence of some thirty-nine minutes a shout went up when the first man was in sight, this turning out to be the first to leave the field. Bell on entering the straight for home closely followed by his clubmate M'Donald, received a great cheer. This however, was

than when the popular D. M'Phee, seven seconds later, or fourteen seconds behind Bell, passed the tape. M'Phee's performance was a great one, and no one was more pleased than his father, who witnessed the grand performance. J. Henderson, of Garscube Harriers, who finished first in the "no race," came in eighth, with club-mates Veitch and M'Turk fourth and fifth respectively. After the first three had passed the winning post there was little or no excitement. Bell's time (actual winner) was 39min 40sec; M'Donald, 39min 47sec; and M'Phee, 39min 54sec—not at all bad time for seven miles over open country.

WESTERN DISTRICT CHAMPIONSHIP.

"NO RACE."

The annual Western District junior championship, under the auspices of the National Cross-Country Union of Scotland, was down for decision from the Glasgow Agricultural Society's Show-grounds, Scotstoun, on Saturday, but the arrangements and race were unsatisfactory right from the start, and in the end "no race" was declared. The competitors arrived at the ground much earlier than usual, and soon after the advertised time were ready to start. On calling over the names, it was found that Duncan McPhee (Clydesdale H.), who was greatly fancied for the individual honour, was absent, being confined to the house with influenza. The start of the race was fixed to take place near the entrance gates, and when the first lot of runners came to the mark they evidently started off on their own, with the result that a number of the competitors were left far in the rear. Naturally, these runners were disappointed, and in order to get on terms with the field the majority cut across the ground. The race has grown to such an extent that in future the officials will have to make more perfect arrangements. To ensure a fair start a rope ought to be stretched across the starting place, to be released immediately all the competitors are lined up and ready. It would also be advisable that ropes should encircle corners of the ground where the runners are tempted to leave the correct course.

As usual in this championship, those in front cut out a killing pace. After covering a lap of the ground, R. Bell (Monkland) was at the head of affairs, closely followed by a Bellahouston reserve man, J. Barker, W. P. Brown (Glasgow Y.M.C.A.H.), and J. Kerr (Motherwell Y.M.C.A.H.). After another circuit of the enclosure, and on leaving for the open country, F. McCormack (Clydesdale), was leading W. Cowie (Olympic) and J. Morris (West of Scotland), but the great crowd of runners were bunched together at this stage. After the race had been started about forty minutes, a number of runners were observed coming from an opposite direction to where the trail had been laid, and it was at once seen

The judges immediately held a meeting, and as it could not be said definitely who had followed the correct course, they had no alternative but to declare the race void. Such a decision is to be regretted, but under the circumstances it was the only finding they could come to. The date when the race will be re-run will be announced later.
