SUTTIE SMITH'S BROTHER WINS NOVICE TITLE

EGLINTON'S TEAM SUCCESS

The sixteenth annual novice championship meeting of the National Cross-Country Union of Scotland was held at Hamilton Racecourse on Saturday afternoon over a course of approximately four and three-quarter miles. Recent rains had made the going heavy, but the conditions overhead were good.

Of the 36 clubs entered for the team event only one, Glasgow Transport, failed to start a team, having only two runners forward, who ran as individuals. Thirty-three teams finished, an excellent tribute to the training of the lads.

At two and a half miles C. Smith, of Hawkhill Harriers, led the field, J. Bailo, of Trinity Academicals, and T. Lamb, of Bellahouston, running next in order. In the succeeding mile Smith had drawn clear of his field, and was leading Bailo by 30 yards. S. Kennedy, of Shawfield, now running in third place. Bailo lost ground in the last mile, Smith going further ahead to win by 100 yards from J. E. Farrell, the Maryhill champion, who beat Lamb by ten yards for second place. Farrell finished with a spurt, which brought him up from seventh place.

Smith, who is 19 years of age, is a brother of J. Suttie Smith, the old Scottish champion. He is a slightly-built lad, and his style is distinctly reminiscent of his noted brother. He finished the race very fresh and impressed as having something in hand. Suttie Smith never won this race; he finished second to S. K. Tombe in season 1925-6.

Eglinton Harriers won the team honour by reason of their magnificent packing. Their first man home, J. Wallace, finished only twelfth, but all four counting men were inside the first 20. This was the Ayrshire club's second victory in the event, having won in season 1926-7.

Maryhill Harriers who won a year ago did remarkably well to run into second place with a new team. Beith Harriers had probably the hardest luck of all the clubs engaged. They had actually three counting men in the first nine, but their fourth man finished only 86th, which put them back into fourth place.
