DUNDEE THISTLE HARRIERS' STRONG TEAM

Chief Runners in the Relay

Thirteen of Scotland's leading cross-country clubs will be represented in the annual Edinburgh to Glasgow road relay race on Saturday. The distance is 44½ miles and Plebeian Harriers are holders of the trophy.

One hundred and four runners will take part in the race, which is decided in eight stages.

Dundee Thistle Harriers make a welcome reappearance and will be represented by G. Simpkins, D. Coburn, D. Gowans, A. Hay, J. McKechnie, W. D. Slidders, D. Adams, and J. M. S. Melville. The race starts from St Andrews Square, Edinburgh, not later than 2.30 p.m.

George Simpkins takes the first relay for Dundee Thistle, St Andrews Square to Maybury Cross, a distance of 5½ miles. This will be a gruelling test. Plebeian Harriers, holders, have the former internationalist, W. J. Gunn, to set a cracking pace; Maryhill rely on Tom Blakeley, Scottish three-mile record holder; while Shettleston turns out W. Sutherland, Scottish cross-country reserve, who may hand over for Shettleston with a lead at Maybury Cross.

D. Coburn runs for Dundee Thistle in the second relay from Maybury Cross to Broxburn East U.P. Church, a distance of six miles, but the Dundonians are likely to be still in the rear, Plebeian having Maxie Rayne, former internationalist, to keep the pace rolling. Rayne, incidentally, holds the record for this relay, 31 min. 24 sec., in 1931.

Where Thistle May Move Up.

A. Hay (Dundee Thistle), Eastern junior cross-country champion, should get a move on in the fourth relay, Wester Dochmont Farm to Goth Tower, Armadale, 5½ miles, the record for which is 31 min. 6 sec., by Donald Urquhart (Garscube) in 1931.

It will be interesting to see how Hay's pace compares with J. C. Ross (Shettleston), Scottish internationalist last month.

J. McKechnie (Dundee Thistle) should also help his club forward over the fifth relay, Armadale to Forrestfield Inn, where Springburn promises to move forward, with Plebeian, Shettleston, and Maryhill the likely leaders. The record for this stretch of 5½ miles is 27 min. 53 sec., by S. K. Tombo (Plebeian), in 1931.

Suttie Smith's Record.

J. Suttie Smith, Dundee, holds the record for the relay from Forrestfield Inn to Airdrie War Memorial, a distance of seven miles, at 34 min. 7 sec., made in 1930, but the Dundonian will not run on this occasion as he is now a member of the Canon A.S.C., Edinburgh, and only the first fifteen clubs to finish in the Scottish cross-country championship are eligible to compete in this race.

W. D. Slidders, who runs in the sixth relay for Dundee Thistle, has drawn a hot packet in J. C. Flockhart (Shettleston), the new Scottish champion; S. R. Tombo (Plebeian); J. Curvin (Garscube); D. Allison (Springburn), and T. Tod (Kilmarnock).

J. M. Adams carries the Dundee Thistle baton over the seventh relay from Airdrie to Springhill Cross, Barrachine, where the hot-pots are D. T. Muir (Maryhill), A. Armstrong (Plebeian), H. Houghie (Springburn), and T. Littlejohn (Shettleston).

Probable Winners.

J. M. S. Melville should be able to bring Dundee Thistle well forward in the last lap, Barrachine to Royal Exchange, Glasgow, a distance of five miles, where the issue may be open between Shettleston, Maryhill, and Plebeian.

Don McLean (Maryhill) is the outstanding runner in the last relay, but he may be too far behind the Shettleston and Plebeian representatives at the take-over to make any impression. The record is 24 min. 22 sec. by F. L. Stevenson (Monkland) in 1930, who runs in this section again.

The full course record is 5 hours 50 min. 29 sec. by Plebeian Harriers in 1931. The clubs who will compete on Saturday are Bellahouston, Dundee Thistle, Edinburgh, Garscube, Greenock, Glaisher, Hamilton, Kilmarnock, Maryhill, Monkland, Motherwell, Plebeian, Shettleston, and Springburn.

Second Relay, Maybury to Broxburn.—M. Payne, Plebeian; D. M'N. Robertson, Maryhill.

Third Relay, Broxburn to Wester Dechmont.—W. E. Calderwood, Maryhill.

Fourth Relay, Wester Dechmont to Armadeale.—A. Hay, Dundee Thistle; J. C. Ross, ~~Shettleston~~; W. Nelson, Maryhill.

Sixth Relay, Forrestfield to Airdrie War Memorial.—J. C. Flockhart, Shettleston; S. K. Tombo, Plebeian.

GREAT RELAY EVENT.

Big Crowds Line Road From Edinburgh To Glasgow.

VICTORS' FOURTH WIN.

EVERYONE in Broxburn, Bathgate, Armadale, Airdrie and Coatbridge seemed to be gathered on the Glasgow-Edinburgh road on Saturday afternoon to see the great relay road race organised by the *Daily Record*.

Nearer Glasgow, through **Shelfester** and along Duke Street, the crowds were of the size that turn out to royal visits, and the gathering for the finish in Exchange Square was huge.

Little short of half a million men, women and children must have been gathered along the route to see the event and cheer the contestants with wild enthusiasm.

There was a big crowd at St. Andrew's Square, Edinburgh, when the runners were sent off by Councillor Stevenson, and out through Corstorphine the streets were lined.

Hordes of Cyclists.

Hordes of cyclists followed the runners from the start, and it would not be surprising to find as a result of their presence quite a number of motorists prostrate with nervous shock. Once or twice cyclists had bad spills dashing through the narrow lanes of spectators.

towns and villages became so dense that the police had difficulty in keeping clear a path for the runners, and as the teams drew closer to the finishing point the spectators grew more enthusiastic.

DUNDEE MAN'S BURST.

From the start, Plebeian **Harrion**, who have won the trophy on the three occasions on which the race has been run, had the event in their pocket, and their men merited the enthusiasm with which the crowds greeted them. But it was Dundee and Maryhill **Harrion**—who finished second and third respectively—that gave the crowd the big thrills.

Maryhill held second place right to within half-a-mile from the finish, when J. M. S. Melville put Dundee ahead in a thrilling finish.

CROWDS ENTERTAINED.

A novel way of entertaining the crowds at the relay stations was adopted this time. The leading 'bus had loud speaker equipment, and in addition to broadcasting music the announcer kept the spectators informed of the progress of the race.

After the race, the runners were the guests of the *Daily Record* to tea in Rombach's Restaurant, where Mr. Howieson, president of the S.A.A.A., presided. Mr. John Dunlop ("Waverley"), Sports Editor of the *Daily Record*, handed over the trophy and the medals.
