

BARR'S IRN BRU EDINBURGH TO GLASGOW RELAY, NOVEMBER 17

MIZUNO Racing Club collected Scotland's most prestigious road relay title for a record-breaking sixth year in a row.

Shettleston Harriers were runners-up for the second time in three years and Hunters Bog Trotters won their first-ever place on the rostrum when finishing third.

Mizuno, undefeated in relay competition this winter, eclipsed Victoria Park AC's record of five wins between 1950 and '54. And for three members of the winning squad – Brian Kirkwood, Davie Ross and John Robson – there was the added prestige of having appeared in all six Racing Club victories.

Shettleston's quest for the title, which has eluded them for 20 years, got off to a promising start when Dave Cameron gave the Glasgow side a 100 metres lead over Mizuno's Kirkwood on the opening leg. Both men had to play second fiddle, however, to Clydesdale's Allan Adams who led the field home by six seconds.

British international Chris Robison put Shettleston into the lead on the second stage as he overhauled Clydesdale's Steve Doig and pulled away from Mizuno's Ken Chapman with an aggressive piece of front running.

National cross country champion Bobby Quinn pulled Kilbarchan up from fourth to second ahead of Mizuno while Neil Wilkinson hoisted Cambuslang from sixth to fourth. Further down the field Alan Puckrin, having started in 19th position, clocked the fastest stage of the day when hauling Greenock Glenpark up to 13th.



effort on stage three to keep Shettleston ahead of a fast-closing Scott Cohen who reduced Mizuno's deficit on the leaders from 36 seconds at the beginning of the leg to just six seconds. Cambuslang slipped back to fourth while Scottish Universities cross country champion Sandy Moss put Fife AC into third spot almost two minutes behind the leading two sides.

Mizuno's Davie Ross and Shettleston's Adrian Callan then engaged in an exciting battle on stage four which ended with just a stride separating the two clubs at the changeover. Robert Fitzsimmons also ran well to bring Kilbarchan back into the picture in third place ahead of Cambuslang, Clydesdale and Fife. The top two sides were now, however, almost three minutes ahead of their pursuers.

John Robson, who enters the veteran ranks in January, gave Mizuno a narrow advantage on the fifth leg as he powered home 13 seconds ahead of Shettleston's Billy Coyle. Track star Des Roache set a

stage record as he took Clydesdale into a distant third place with Cambuslang fourth and Kilbarchan fifth.

The see-saw battle for supremacy at the head of the field took another swing on the long sixth stage as Graeme Wight took Shettleston back into a three-second lead ahead of Mizuno's Peter Fleming. The Racing Club man performed extremely well considering he was still

recovering from finishing second in the Columbus Marathon in Ohio the previous weekend when he recorded 2:19:50.

Graeme Croll brought Cambuslang back into the bronze medal position while Phil Mowbray clocked the fastest stage time when lifting Hunters Bog Trotters into fourth spot.

The outcome of the race was sealed on the seventh stage when Tom Hanlon, whose training has been curtailed in recent weeks because of a groin strain, eased Mizuno 42 seconds ahead of Shettleston's Brian Scally. Ian Reid kept Cambuslang in third.

Will Grant, an Edinburgh University geography student who hails from Canterbury, raised more than a few eyebrows with the fastest stage time as he hauled Hunters Bog Trotters closer to the medal positions with an outstanding run.

Glen Stewart secured victory for Mizuno with a fine last leg run which brought him home just 11 seconds outside Peter Fleming's stage record.

John Mackay clinched second place for Shettleston while Irishman Pat O'Keefe completed Hunters Bog Trotters' late surge to snatch the bronze medal position ahead of a fading Cambuslang.

Livingston and District, led by fine efforts from John Sherban and Peter Dymoke, were given the award for the most meritorious performance when finishing eighth, an improvement of six places on 1995.

Afterwards Mizuno team manager Alan Robson expressed satisfaction at the outcome.

He said: "The club was formed six years ago and we've won the race six times. It's a good record.

"I was a little bit concerned because Tom Hanlon had only trained twice in the last fortnight and I only found out about Peter Fleming's marathon when he arrived back in Scotland this week. Still, it all worked out well in the end."

Shettleston's Chris Robison was disappointed but not disheartened: "We gave them a good battle for a long way. At least I've got the consolation of winning my first Edinburgh to Glasgow medal. That's made it worthwhile."

English visitors Bedford and County finished 15th on their first visit to the big race. Club official Frank Jackson, a former member of Bellahouston Harriers, said: "The lads enjoyed the experience."

"We were missing some of our top runners, otherwise we might have been a few places higher. But hopefully we'll be back."
