Each competitor must wear, BACK AND FRONT, the number and the letter shown in this programme.

News of the World arrow signs will be shown throughout the Course at all turns, and banners show each take-over.

FIRST RELAY.

(5½ miles)
(approx. time of arrival 11.55 a.m.)

Starting from St. Andrew's Square, North David Street, Queen Street, Albyn Place, St. Colne Street, Ainslie Place, Great Stuart Street, Randolph Crescent, Melville Street, Manor Place, Coates Place, West Maitland Street, Haymarket Station, Clifton Terrace, Haymarket Terrace, under Railway Arch, Roseburn Terrace, Corstorphine Road to Maybury Cross. First take-over. Distance: 5½ miles.

SECOND RELAY.

(6 miles)
(12.25 p.m.)

Main Glasgow Road, left fork to Newbridge, over stone bridge, under viaduct, right fork by Broxburn A.A. box to Broxburn East U.F. Church. Distance: 11½ miles.

THIRD RELAY.

(4 miles)
(12.45 p.m.)

Main Road to Uphall, right fork, sharp rise to Dechmont (switchback going) to Wester Dechmont Farm. Distance: 15½ miles.

FOURTH RELAY.

(5½ miles)
(1.15 p.m.)

Main Road right fork, then fork left for Bathgate, over level crossing to Armadale (Clock Tower). Distance 21½ miles.

FIFTH RELAY.

(5½ miles)
(1.45 p.m.)

Main Road, Blackbridge, over railway bridge, Forrestfield Station to Forrestfield Hotel. Distance: 26½ miles.

SIXTH RELAY.

(7 miles)
(2.20 p.m.)

Main Road, Hillend, Caldercruix, under railway bridge, Plains, Clarkstone, Airdrie, Alexandra Street, Airdrie War Memorial. Distance: 33½ miles.

SEVENTH RELAY.

(5½ miles)
(2.50 p.m.)

Main Road, under railway bridge, Coatbridge Greyhound-Enclosure, Bank Street, Coatbridge, Bargeddie P.O., Ballyleiston, Spring Hill Cross, Barrachnie, Telephone Box. Distance: 39½ miles.

EIGHTH RELAY.

(5 miles)
(3.15 p.m.)

Main Shettleston Road, Shettleston, right fork, under railway bridge, Duke Street, turn left into High Street, turn right into Ingram Street to the Stirling Library (formerly Royal Exchange) Queen Street. Full Distance: 44½ miles.

All competitors must keep to the left-hand side of the road whilst running. Cutting corners is not allowed. Any competitor indulging in this dangerous practice will render his team liable to disqualification.

1957 NATIONAL RACE (LONDON—BRIGHTON)

IBBOTSON IS HERO OF SOUTH LONDON'S RELAY WIN

SOUTH London Harriers are the team of the season—if you like, the team of the decade—for, not only did they score their fourth successive win in the News of the World London to Brighton national road relay yesterday, they also sliced 3 min. 27 sec. off their 1955 course record.

They clocked 4 hr. 25 min. 52 sec. for the 11-stage course of 54 miles 1,348 yards. In a thrilling struggle Thames Valley were second and Belgrave Harriers third. All finished inside the old record.

Stars of the South London side were Derek Ibbotson, who with feet cut and bleeding picked up six places over the third leg of 5½ miles, Roy Darchambaud, Laurie Reed, Jim Scovell and Rowland Langridge.

Intermediate course records were broken by four men on the sixth stage of 5½ miles between Merstham and Redhill, and by six men on the next stage.

Kevin Gilligan (Pembroke Liverpool) sprung a surprise on the first leg from Westminster to Clapham by heading Olympic miler Ken Wood. A sparkling run by Dave Richards put Polytechnic in the lead. But it was a short lived success.

South London were in 10th place at the start of the third stage. Then came Ibbotson's courageous effort. Indifferent to the pain he was suffering from wearing a new pair of shoes which were too tight, he ploughed away in fearless style to hand over in third place.

Darchambaud took South London to the front, but Sheffield who had been prominent throughout took the initiative at the end of the fifth relay, through a particularly fine effort by A. Barden.

Then came that wonderful sixth leg when Laurie Reed (South London), Tony Lewis (Woodford Green), Eddie Ellis (Thames Valley), and K. Whatham (Sheffield U.) all broke the previous best of 25 min. 6 sec. which Alec Olney established four years ago.

Thirty-one-year-old Jackie Brown played a major part in Belgrave's bid when he headed the record-breakers over the next stage. His 32 min. 20 sec. was 32 sec. inside the old figures.

Also inside the previous best for this stage were Frank Sando (Aylesford P.M.), Bert Ingles (Thames Valley), Basil Heatley (Coventry), Peter Driver (South London), and Arthur Keily (Derby).

A great effort by Ken Norris over the eighth stage took Thames Valley into a 200 yards' lead only for Jimmy Scovell, a South London newcomer to hand over level with Thames Valley rival Barry Saunders at the end of the ninth relay.

But from then on it was South London all the way. Langridge raced away and was never troubled, handing over to the last man, F. Gilson. Derby created one of the surprises of the day by filling fifth position and they were rightly awarded medals for the most meritorious performance.

INSTRUCTIONS FOR COMPETITORS AND OFFICIALS

A letter from the Rt. Hon. Sir John G. Banks, C.B.E., Kt., Lord Provost of Edinburgh, addressed to the Rt. Hon. Andrew Hood, Lord Provost of Glasgow, will be handed to the first representative of Victoria Park A.A.C., (last year's winners) at the start by Bailie Magnus J. Williamson of Edinburgh, and will be handed to the Lord Provost of Glasgow's deputy, Bailie John Blackwood at the winning post.

All teams will carry a baton throughout the race.

Competitors' coaches, numbered as per relays 1-8, will take runners to their respective starting points, and pick them up again at the end of their relays. All competitors *must* travel in the official coaches.

All competitors, except those running the first relay, must be in their respective coaches, ready to start at 11.0 a.m. No competitor will be waited for. Only competitors and officials with Coach Tickets will be allowed to travel in the coaches.

To avoid congestion, no coaches must stop within 100 yards beyond each Take-Over. Coach drivers are asked by the Organisers to observe this request strictly.

The first ten teams to finish will qualify for next year's race. The remaining teams to be invited will be selected by the Scottish A.A.A. and S.N.C.C.U.
