RELAYS AND EXCHANGE STATIONS

The runners, totalling 160, will be divided into eight relays of 20.

Each competitor must wear, BACK AND FRONT, the number and the letter shown in this programme.

News of the World arrow signs will be shown throughout the Course at all turns, and banners show each take-over.

FIRST RELAY.

(5½ miles)
(approx. time of arrival 11.55 a.m.)

Starting from St. Andrew Square, North David Street, Queen Street, Albyn Place, St. Colne Street, Ainslie Place, Great Stuart Street, Randolph Crescent, Melville Street, Manor Place, Coates Place, West Maitland Street, Haymarket Station, Clifton Terrace, Haymarket Terrace, under Railway Arch, Roseburn Terrace, Corstorphine Road to Maybury Cross. First take-over. Distance: 5½ miles.

SECOND RELAY.

(6 miles)
(12.25 p.m.)

Main Glasgow Road, left fork to Newbridge, over stone bridge, under viaduct, right fork by Broxburn A.A. box to Broxburn East U.F. Church. Distance: 11½ miles.

THIRD RELAY.

(4 miles)
(12.45 p.m.)

Main Road to Uphall, right fork, sharp rise to Dechmont (switchback going) to Wester Dechmont Farm. Distance: 15½ miles.

FOURTH RELAY.

(5½ miles)
(1.15 p.m.)

Main Road right fork, then fork left for Bathgate, over level crossing to Armadale (Clock Tower). Distance 21½ miles.

FIFTH RELAY.

(5½ miles)
(1.45 p.m.)

Main Road, Blackbridge, over railway bridge, Forestfield Station to Forestfield Hotel. Distance: 26½ miles.

SIXTH RELAY.

(7 miles)
(2.20 p.m.)

Main Road, Hillend, Caldercruix, under railway bridge, Plains, Clarkstone, Airdrie, Alexandra Street, Airdrie War Memorial. Distance: 33½ miles.

SEVENTH RELAY.

(5½ miles)
(2.50 p.m.)

Main Road, under railway bridge, Coatbridge Greyhound-Enclosure, Bank Street, Coatbridge, Bargeddie P.O., Bailieston, Spring Hill Cross, Barrachnie, Telephone Box. Distance: 39½ miles.

EIGHTH RELAY.

(5 miles)
(3.15 p.m.)

Main Shettleston Road, Shettleston, right fork, under railway bridge, Duke Street, turn left into High Street, turn right into Ingram Street to the Stirling Library (formerly Royal Exchange) Queen Street. Full distance: 44½ miles.

All competitors must keep to the left-hand side of the road whilst running. Cutting corners is not allowed. Any competitor indulging in this dangerous practice will render his team liable to disqualification.

1960 NATIONAL RELAY RACE (LONDON TO BRIGHTON)

Keily & Co. Keep Title For Derby

Reprinted from the "NEWS OF THE WORLD" April 10th, 1960

DERBY and County Athletic Club won the "News of the World" London to Brighton National road relay yesterday for the second year running—and I do mean running.

They took the lead early in the second stage between Clapham Common and Mitcham and they never looked back. It wasn't worth their while—they couldn't have seen anybody over their shoulders, anyway.

Derby won in 4 hr. 33 min. 18 sec., more than seven minutes faster than last year's time.

Second were Portsmouth Athletic Club in 4 hr. 37 min. 35 sec., and South London Harriers were third in 4-38-25.

With Derby so far ahead so early in the race the main excitement lay in the battle for second and third places. It was a battle that continued right until the last stage when Portsmouth's Tim Johnston gritted his teeth and ground his way past Roy Darchambaud of South London Harriers to finish 50 sec. ahead.

Britain's established stars showed up well. Martin Hyman paved the way for Portsmouth's second place with a magnificent record-breaking run in the 8th and longest lap. He covered the six miles 264 yards in 28 min. 59 sec. and hauled his team from 9th to 4th place.

But guarding Derby's proud No. 1 position on this lap was wily Arthur Keily. He maintained his team's lead over one of the most agonising parts of the course.

As he sipped a glass of squash afterwards Arthur said: "Ee, boy, those sudden gusts of wind were so strong on the hills that I thought I was standing still sometimes."

On the next 6 mile lap Gordon Pirie (South London Harriers) and Bruce Tulloch (Portsmouth) had a terrific duel.

Pirie was first away, but the tiny Tulloch caught him and raced at a searing pace for miles. Then the long-legged Puffin' Pirie forced his way ahead.

Coventry Godiva Harriers looked like becoming the shock team of the day when Basil Heatley, with a time only three seconds outside the lap record, pulled them from 10th position to 2nd on the third leg. They kept this position for most of the race until on the eighth stage, their runner unfortunately took the wrong turning, dropping them to 8th place.

Thames Valley Harriers were forced to drop out when John Cameron collapsed while running the 5th stage.

The special medals for the most meritorious performance went to the Manchester and District Lads' Club Harriers, and if that doesn't make some of the club's officials blush it ought to. Those officials didn't want the club to enter the relay; they didn't think they stood any chance.

INSTRUCTIONS FOR COMPETITORS AND OFFICIALS

A letter from the Rt. Hon. J. Geig Dunbar, Lord Provost of Edinburgh, addressed to the Rt. Hon. Mrs. Jean Roberts, J.P. Lord Provost of Glasgow, will be handed to the first representative of Shettleston H. (last year's winners) at the start by Bailie James Ross of Edinburgh, and will be delivered to the Lord Provost of Glasgow's deputy, Bailie William Brown at the winning post.

All teams will carry a baton throughout the race.

Any team falling 30 minutes behind the leading team will be taken out of the race.

Competitors' coaches, numbered as per relays 1-8, will take runners to their respective starting points, and pick them up again at the end of their relays. All competitors *must* travel in the official coaches.

All competitors, except those running the first relay, must be in their respective coaches, ready to start at 11.0 a.m. No competitor will be waited for. Only competitors and officials with Coach Tickets will be allowed to travel in the coaches.

To avoid congestion, no coaches must stop within 100 yards of each Take-over. Coach drivers are asked by the Organisers to observe this request strictly.

The first ten teams to finish will qualify for next year's race. The remaining teams to be invited will be selected by the Scottish A.A.A. and S.N.C.C.U.
